HOW TO STORE METHOCARBAMOL</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Keep this medicine out of the sight and reach of children.</li> <li>- Do not use methocarbamol after the expiry date, which is stated on the bottle label. The expiry date refers to the last day of the month.</li> <li>- Do not throw any medicines via wastewater</li> </ul>	<p>or household waste. Ask your pharmacist how to throw away medicines you no longer use. These measures will help protect the environment.</p> <p><b>6. CONTENTS OF THE PACK AND OTHER INFORMATION</b></p> <p><b>What methocarbamol contains</b></p> <p>The active substance is methocarbamol. Each film-coated tablet contains 750mg of methocarbamol.</p> <p>The other ingredients are: maize starch, povidone (PVP K-30), sodium laurylsulfate, sodium starch glycolate Type A (Glycolys), talc, magnesium stearate and Opadry II white, which consists of polyvinyl alcohol-part hydrolyzed, titanium dioxide (E171), Macrogol/PEG 3350, Talc (E553b).</p> <p><b>What methocarbamol looks like and contents of the pack</b></p> <p>Methocarbamol 750mg Tablets are white capsule shaped film-coated tablets with break line on one side. The score line is only to facilitate breaking for ease of swallowing and not to divide into equal doses.</p> <p>Methocarbamol tablets are packed in a white HDPE tablet container with a child resistant cap. 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<p><b>1. WHAT METHOCARBAMOL IS AND WHAT IT IS USED FOR</b></p> <p>Methocarbamol belongs to a group of medicines called 'muscle relaxants'. They are used for the short term treatment of pain and muscle spasm caused by injuries such as sprains and strains.</p> <p><b>2. WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE YOU TAKE METHOCARBAMOL</b></p> <p><b>Do not take this medicine if you:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- are allergic (hypersensitive) to methocarbamol or have had problems in the past with methocarbamol</li> <li>- are allergic to any of the other ingredients of this medicine (listed in section 6)</li> <li>- have ever suffered any brain damage or coma</li> <li>- suffer from epilepsy or convulsions</li> <li>- suffer from muscle weakness (a disease called myasthenia gravis)</li> </ul> <p><b>Warnings and precautions</b></p> <p>Talk to your doctor before taking methocarbamol if you:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- are pregnant or thinking of becoming pregnant</li> <li>- are breastfeeding</li> <li>- have, or have had, any kidney or liver problems</li> </ul>	<p>- are having any medical investigations or tests as methocarbamol could interfere with the results. Tell your doctor that you are taking methocarbamol before you have the test.</p> <p>If you are not sure if any of the above applies to you, talk to your doctor or pharmacist before taking methocarbamol.</p> <p><b>Children and adolescents</b></p> <p>This medicine is not recommended for use in children due to a lack of data.</p> <p><b>Other medicines and Methocarbamol</b></p> <p>Tell your doctor or pharmacist if you are taking</p> <p>or have recently taken or might take any other medicines. This includes medicines you buy without a prescription, including herbal medicines. This is because Methocarbamol affects the way some other medicines work. Also some medicines can affect the way methocarbamol works.</p> <p><b>If you are taking any of the following medicines, you should tell your doctor or pharmacist as methocarbamol may interact with them:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Barbiturates which can be taken for epilepsy or to help you sleep.</li> <li>- Appetite suppressants to help you lose weight.</li> </ul>	<p>- Medicines for stomach upsets or sea-sickness (anti-cholinergics).</p> <p>- Psychotropic drugs for the treatment of anxiety, depression or other mental illnesses.</p> <p>- If you are due to have anaesthetic for any reason, tell your doctor or dentist that you are taking methocarbamol.</p> <p>If you are not sure if any of the above applies to you, talk to your doctor or pharmacist before taking methocarbamol.</p> <p><b>Methocarbamol and alcohol</b></p> <p>Methocarbamol should be taken with a drink that does not contain alcohol. Do not drink alcohol while you are taking methocarbamol.</p> <p><b>Pregnancy, breast-feeding and fertility</b></p> <p>Do not take this medicine if you are pregnant or might become pregnant unless your doctor tells you to. Contact your doctor if you think you may be pregnant, or are intending to become pregnant.</p> <p>Do not take this medicine if you are breast-feeding or planning to breast-feed.</p> <p>No data are available concerning the effect of this medicine on human fertility.</p>	<p><b>Driving and using machines</b></p> <p>Methocarbamol may make you feel sleepy and may affect your ability to drive, operate machinery and carry out other hazardous activities. These activities should therefore be avoided altogether until you are sure you are not affected.</p> <p><b>3. HOW TO TAKE METHOCARBAMOL</b></p> <p>Always take this medicine exactly as your doctor has told you. Check with your doctor if you are not sure.</p> <p><b>Adults:</b> Take TWO tablets with a little water, FOUR times a day. Sometimes a lower dose may be sufficient. You should spread the doses as evenly as possible over a 24-hour period.</p> <p><b>Elderly:</b> older patients may only need half the usual dose to give the same relief from the pain and muscle spasms.</p> <p><b>Liver impairment:</b> you may need a longer interval between taking the tablets if you have liver disease. You should always follow your doctor's instructions carefully.</p> <p>These tablets are for short-term treatment. Take them for as long as your doctor has</p>	<p>recommended, or until you no longer need them to ease the pain. Return any unused tablets to your pharmacist.</p> <p><b>If you take more Methocarbamol than you should</b></p> <p>It is important to stick to your prescribed dose. If you or someone else takes too much medicine, contact your doctor or nearest hospital emergency department immediately. Always take any medicine left over with you and also the bottle, as this will allow easier identification of the medicine.</p> <p><b>If you forget to take Methocarbamol</b></p> <p>If you forget to take a dose, simply take the next dose when it is due. Do not take a double dose of tablets to make up for a forgotten dose.</p> <p><b>If you stop taking Methocarbamol</b></p> <p>Keep taking methocarbamol until your doctor tells you to stop. If you have any further questions on the use of this product, ask your doctor or pharmacist.</p> <p><b>4. POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS</b></p> <p>Like all medicines, methocarbamol can cause side effects although not everybody gets them.</p>
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
